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Bridging Hearts and Community

Nestled amidst the tree lined avenues of Los Feliz's Franklin Hills stands an architectural gem that not only spans the physical gap between two sides but also bridges the hearts of the community surrounding it. The Shakespeare Bridge, an elegant relic of another era, is more than just a concrete structure; it's a symbol of neighborly pride and unity.

Built in 1926, the Shakespeare Bridge owes its name to the Elizabethan-style architecture that graces its design. It was the brainchild of a visionary, civil engineer J.C. Wright, who sought to create a bridge that not only connected the neighborhood but also elevated its aesthetic appeal.

Over the decades, the Shakespeare Bridge has played a role far beyond its utilitarian function. It's become a central hub where neighbors converge, stories are shared, photos are taken and a sense of belonging is fostered. It earned its place on the National Register of Historic Places on April 17th, 1974, and its preservation is a testament to the pride that the community takes in its history.

Throughout the year, the bridge serves as a backdrop for various community events and gatherings. The FHRA has been decorating

the bridge for seasonal holidays since 1998. The summer brings rainbow flags for Pride, Juneteenth flags to commemorate the emancipation of enslaved people in the U.S., American flags for Memorial Day, Flag Day, and the Fourth of July, then fall harvest, Halloween, and the winter holidays.

In an era where divisiveness can often dominate the headlines, the Shakespeare Bridge stands as a symbol of unity. When the Pride flags were repeatedly vandalized this past June, neighbors and friends donated time, money and resources to keep the flags flying.

The preservation of the Shakespeare Bridge is not just a matter of maintaining a historic structure; it's about safeguarding the heart and soul of a neighborhood. It's a tribute to the visionaries who built it, the generations who have cherished it, and the residents who continue to make it a symbol of neighborly pride.

As long as this elegant structure spans across the gully, it will continue to bridge the hearts of those who call the Franklin Hills home.

Senon Williams on Creativity by "The Michaels"

A Los Angeles native, Senon Williams was raised in the Miracle Mile district, and has been a Franklin Hills resident since 1997.

He is a visual artist, and a founding member and bassist for the internationally acclaimed band Dengue Fever. Founded in 2001, they combine Cambodian psychedelic rock music from the 60s and 70s with influences from each individual member's musical and cultural experiences.

Senon was creatively inclined from a very early age, initially expressing himself through drumming.

"It was just basically about having something to beat on. I loved the feeling of hitting this instrument and creating sound. It was very much an emotional outlet at that age in my life and continues to be.'

"I don't think I performed live until I was about 16. My first gig was at Al's Bar, which was a legendary dive downtown. The funny thing is that I played a mic'd power drill. And someone else played power saw. We backed up a poet. So, my first performance wasn't really music, it was more like a performance art piece or noise." He has always been immersed in art and has evolved greatly since then. Senon began working seriously in visual art in 2016.

"Most of my friends are musicians or visual artists. I always made art, but I never really focused on it because I was always busy with the band making records. I always knew that there was gonna be a serious shift in my life."

"When I create my paintings, I create them so anybody can look at them, and hopefully feel something, or at least question something or create a genesis of some new thought that they hadn't had before looking at my work. I think the simple act of reading or viewing art is creative. Everyone is creative but I think to create something yourself is a practice."

For Senon, creativity is also a family affair, something he weaves into his home life as well.

"I personally believe the greatest gift you can give your child is happiness, and experience. Part of my happiness is playing music and part of the experience is him [son Cypress] experiencing me playing music."

And Senon's future aspirations?

'Something on a large scale, public art, like something in a metro station or the side of a building.'

Dengue Fever's new album, Ting Mong, was released in September 2023 and is available on all major streaming platforms. Large portions of the album and many of their hits over the years were recorded or mixed In Senon's home recording studio on Camero Ave in Franklin Hills. When not creating art, Senon can be found throwing neighborhood parties and co-hosting Camero Avenue's annual 4th of July Block Party, manning a mean smoker grill.



At the base of the Franklin Hills on Tracy Street, *Baller Hardware* has a long history of supporting the arts, and it's staffed with talented creatives.

Artist Carol Ann Blanding celebrated 24 years at Baller in October. She spent part of her childhood at the top of Franklin Avenue. Carol moved to Hawaii with her family in 1976, and perhaps that's when the "magic" began. With the Hawaiian islands as a backdrop, fueled by the antics and inspiration of her growing children, Carol created characters in the form of monkeys, lizards, frogs, and skeletons. Almost any of her paintings could inspire an animated cartoon.

Upon returning to the mainland, she served as the art store manager for Baller while continuing to paint. Her fun, whimsical characters made up of colorful dots on canvas were featured at the Los Angeles Contemporary Museum of Art in 2004, and Carol has been singled out as an emerging artist in Art Business News and Art World Magazine.

"My paintings are happy. I like to make people smile," Carol said. She has exhibited at the Glaxa Gallery, Bacchus Gallery, Vida, and The Los Angeles Municipal Art Gallery to name a few. To view Carol's work, visit FineArtAmerica.com and search Carol Ann Blanding.

Co-worker and fellow artist, Shannon Hurley, is also a songwriter and musician gaining traction in Hollywood. Shannon collaborates with trance DJs and has been championed by major industry heavyweights Armin Van Buuren and Paul Oakenfold.

With regard to the neighborhood, Shannon said, "Ben and I are avid walkers and love the Franklin stairs. It's a very inspiring view from the top and makes for a creative day always."



You've seen Clint's artistry for years in some of Hollywood's biggest blockbusters like Top Gun Maverick. Spiderman No Way Home, and Pirates of the Caribbean—Dead Man's Chest. Paramount Pictures, Walt Disney Studios Warner Brothers, Columbia Pictures, and Twentieth Century Fox have all benefited from his award-winning talents. And don't forget about Marvel Studios where he helped create the worlds of Captain America, Dr. Strange, and Black Widow.

major in math and art from the University of Puget Sound, and a master's degree in architecture from UCLA, break into the film industry? "I never wanted to go into the movie business. Architecture was my passion," said Clint. "But a friend of mine in the late 90s asked me to come work with him on a movie starring Eddie Murphy. It was called Pluto Nash and though the film was terrible, it was an eye-opening experience. I was able to connect with some amazingly talented people. Those connections eventually made it possible for me to work on much larger projects like Pirates of the Caribbean."

After living and working in Southern California for many years, what finally brought Clint, his wife Alison, and their two sons to Franklin Hills? "I was hired to work on a Paul Rudd movie I Love You, Man. After scouting locations, we found a house at the corner of Franklin and St George. It was a great house, and I thought wow, this is a cool neighborhood."

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Writers Row

It's a small strip of houses where Franklin Avenue turns into Mayview and ends at Clayton. Franklin Hills has always attracted the Hollywood crowd of creatives, whether an intentional act or a collective conscience. After all, since 1920, Franklin Hills has been the "old Hollywood" guard. Although there are many talented screenwriters in Franklin Hills, I've highlighted the writers in the strip we call "Writers Row."

Becky Johnston is an American screenwriter known for House of Gucci (2021), featuring Lady Gaga; Seven Years in Tibet, (1997), featuring Brad Pitt; and The Prince of Tides, written with Pat Conroy (1991), featuring Barbara Streisand. Becky first bought her house in Franklin Hills in 1987. The cottage style retreat was perfect for writing and inspiration: the peaceful seclusion, beautiful lush grounds, and views.

Jonathan Ames is an American author and screenwriter born in New York City. Jonathan graduated from Princeton University in 1987 with a degree in English. He has a Master of Fine Arts degree in fiction from Columbia University, where he has been an infrequent faculty member. He is the creator of Bored to Death (HBO) and Blunt Talk (STARZ). Two of his novels were adapted into films; You Were Never Really Here (2017), starring Joaquin Phoenix, and The Extra Man (2010), starring Kevin Kline.

Dawn DeNoon is an American screenwriter and executive producer for Law and Order Special Victims Unit. She was one of the first writers for Law and Order SVU from 1999-2011 and wrote 42 episodes over 12 years. In 2002 DeNoon received the Edgar Allen Poe Award for mystery writers.

DeNoon bought her house in 2003, a Spanish Mediterranean. One of the things that made Dawn fall in love with Franklin Hills was the charming Shakespeare Bridge, built in 1927. "Maybe it was my love of English literature," she states.

Mike Steere is an author, journalist, producer. and investigative screenwriter, producing numerous documentaries for The Tennis Channel (FOX, ESPN). Mike's investigative magazine feature, In God's Eyes, about crime in the pristine wilds of American National Parks, is now the basis of a television series. Mike and his family bought their Spanish style bungalow in Franklin Hills in 1999. They love the European feel, the quiet, and the beautiful views of the area.





CAALO

Chelsea Claridge is a fashion designer who lives and works across the street from me. She and her partner, Jordan Moussalli, moved here from New York in the summer of 2022.

Chelsea is originally from Vancouver, Canada and from a young age dreamt of being a fashion designer. She studied design and was then recruited by Lululemon, where she worked for a few years before taking a leap to New York, where she designed for global fashion brands for over a decade.

Growing up in Vancouver (and surviving New York winters!) inspired her to create an outerwear brand that was both functionally warm, but also chic and timeless. From this, CAALO was born in 2019.

Fusing luxury with functionality, Chelsea created a modern collection of transformable, trans-seasonal pieces that are expertly crafted from the highest quality, luxury materials. They are ethically and sustainably manufactured, and CAALO has showcased at NY & Paris Fashion Week.

Looking for a change and wanting to be closer to nature, she and Jordan chose the west coast. Being New Yorkers, and loving being surrounded by creative people, they fell in love with the Franklin Hills.

From Sheffield, Pennsylvania, a tiny town in the Allegheny National Forest, Jennifer first studied architecture and art history at Penn State, and then moved to LA to study interiors at FIDM.

After working with Boffi in both LA and NYC, she started her own design business while partnering with LA developer GroundUP. In 2018, after her son was born, she took a step back from design and turned to sewing, another passion of hers since she was a young adult.

After realizing what fast fashion was doing to the earth, she took steps to make her brand, Une Forme, as eco-conscious as possible. With reclaimed and natural fabrics and non-toxic dyes, the pieces are made to order, so there is less waste in landfills, and it allows for more size inclusivity. They are also handmade inhouse – right here in Franklin Hills!

Une Forme apparel is minimal and timeless, with pieces that serve as blank canvases for each person to interpret and personalize, while offering comfort and function for every day.

Jennifer loves living in Franklin Hills with her family, walking the neighborhood, and having mini block parties with her neighbors.

Linnea and Noah have lived in their 1938 Franklin Hills home for 6 1/2 years, attracted by the creative energy they feel in this neighborhood. "And these people are working...it's not just for show," Linnea added.

Noah is originally from Chicago. Linnea was born and raised in Santa Cruz. The couple met in the music department at U.C. Santa Cruz. Noah was a graduate student studying contemporary music composition and Linnea was an undergraduate music student and viola player.

"We met because I played a piece of yours," Linnea reminded Noah.

"She was a big superstar, a big deal undergrad," bragged Noah. He had selected Linnea's string quartet to perform his piece.

Noah explained that Linnea is an "expert interpreter."

"Sometimes she understands better than I do what I'm doing. She's my best composition teacher."

Linnea laughed and returned the kudos, saying that Noah understands the technical side better than she does, and often helps her out. She recalled the pandemic as a time when his technical knowledge and skills helped her with working and recording at home.

The couple has converted their garage to a studio, what Linnea described as, "a sweet little space in the Franklin Hills." It is a place to record, teach, and practice alone and with other musicians. Noah, who teaches music theory, composition, and other subjects at UCLA and at the Colburn School in its college conservatory, taught all of his classes from this space during the pandemic. The detached room, set back from the street, with acoustic panels and comfortable furniture, feels both professional and cozv.

Los Angeles was the logical place for the couple to move following a time in Amsterdam where Noah did postdoctoral work with the late Dutch composer Louis Andriessen.

Linnea said there is so much "living, breathing energy in our field here." She went on, "In LA, I can be doing recording sessions for film and TV, and playing with bands, musical

artists, and traveling Broadway shows." She added, "You can go from playing Mozart to working with Dr. Dre in two days."

Linnea's busy musical life of performing and recording also includes being part of a large collective called Wild Up, as well as a violin/viola twosome called Aperture Duo.

In addition to teaching, Noah is currently composing a piece of music for Piano Spheres, a concert organization. He is also working on an album of contemporary concert music, tentatively scheduled to be released in spring or summer of 2024.

And Zoe? Chances are good that she'll continue to follow her parents' lead, making music in the Franklin Hills for years to come.

Though few of us want to recall our COVID-19 lockdown time, few -- if any -- of us were as productive during that period as artist Jim Matthews. Drawing on the wood whittling he first developed as a 5-year-old, and a lifetime as a world-renowned master jeweler, Jim spent that time transforming the garage of his 1927 Spanish-style home into a fantastic gallery of radiantly-colored artworks.

The project was informed by Jim's travels in Mexico, and many of the pieces begin with items sourced during his frequent visits to thrift stores. In a genius move for a gallery in a confined space, Jim built some assemblages on top of rolling carts so they can be viewed from all sides and easily moved.

The garage art gallery is at once bursting with beauty and exquisitely organized. His art supplies are at arm's reach in colorful and specifically-labeled boxes and jars. In a brilliant feat of spatial visualization, the car can still be parked inside.

The native Texan and his wife, noted jewelry designer Cynthia Bach, moved to Los Angeles after Jim was recruited by Van Cleef and Arpels to be director of design and fabrication for its Beverly Hills store. Their home was one of the first three houses on the hill when the Shakespeare Bridge was built.

Global inspirations converge in the Melbourne Avenue garage of British-born ceramist Kate Vereker. Her open garage door invites curious walkers to watch as she creates singular art pieces, as well as small batch work for luxury brands.

Beyond designing, shaping and firing her work, though, she creates from a more fundamental level, experimenting with bespoke mixes of porcelain and glazes and various firing times and temperatures. She's even adapted dental tools to better realize her vision.

"A kiln is like a friend," she explained.
"You have to get to know it."

A condiment tray in a Tokyo sushi restaurant changed the course of Kate's career. The owner noticed that she was smitten with a shabby, "wabi sabi"-style piece at the table. He shuffled into the kitchen and returned with an expensive art book that included work by groundbreaking artist Lucie Rie, a Jewish-Austrian woman working during WW II. Kate had discovered her hero.

After returning to Amsterdam, she found the book in a library, studied Lucie's style and enrolled at Central Saint Martins in London to study ceramics.

She continues to be fascinated by Japanese culture and incorporates kintsugi into selected works. That art -- of repairing broken objects with gold or precious metals – is a metaphor for embracing the idea that you won't realize your full potential until you've gone through tough times, and that imperfections and scars can result in something more beautiful and valuable.

Kate, husband Jason and daughter Lottie have lived in the Franklin Hills for more than two years.

"When we were going to move here from Italy, I thought the desert plants would be uninspiring, but how wrong I was," she admitted. "I love the cornucopia of plants here," she added. "So sculptural and bold."

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CREATIVE COUPLES Franklin Hills Draws those with

a Love for Local

Creatives' pent up imagination, curiosity, and wit render them more porous to their environments; they exist in deep connection to their surroundings. Creative couples of Franklin Hills are no exception. What drives them to do what they do? Is Franklin Hills just a beautiful bridge surrounded by little boxes on the hillside, or a catalyst for expression? On one end of the creative environment continuum is the isolation of Walden Pond and on the other is Gertrude Stein's Paris and maybe, just maybe, Franklin Hills represents the best of what L.A. has to offer—the opportunity to dial up or down your engagement with the cosmopolitan or the quiet.

I had the distinct pleasure of sitting down with three local couples to explore all this and more, right in our collective backyard.

MIKE + DEAN

Mike and Dean are a delightful couple whom I've always admired for having "figured out" how to live in LA. Dean is the Director of the Estate for artist Robert Therrien (if you've ever been to The Broad museum downtown and walked under a giant table and chairs, that's the artist). Mike is a screenwriter and faculty member at the American Film Institute.

Tell us a little about you as a creative couple.

Mike - "We both were driven by an early love of the visual arts which segued naturally into our current careers. And in terms of creative overlap, we run things by each other - I get to peek at upcoming shows Dean is working on and Dean reads my scripts. Although Dean is relentlessly enthusiastic and laughs way too hard at my jokes, I know I can't count on him to be objective."

Talk to us about any rituals/habits/crutches that you rely on to help you define your day.

Mike - "Dean is not ritualistic, but I am. Lately I've been starting my day at 4:30AM because I discovered it's a great way to avoid humanity. Plus, if your bedtime is 7:30PM, pesky dinner parties are a thing of the past! If it works for Jamie Lee Curtis, it works for me."

For creatives trying to figure it all out, give them some advice.

Mike - "Los Angeles is only as social as you want, because it involves driving and what seemed like a good idea on Monday will suddenly lose its appeal on Friday. This, in theory, frees you up. And I am a big believer that your work speaks for itself. You can be the best networker ever, but if your work is terrible, it won't matter."

What about Franklin Hills do you love, and what do you wish for more of?

Dean - "Franklin Hills is our dream neighborhood. After living in LA for decades, there is nowhere else we'd rather be. For things I'd want more of, I would advocate for more

protected green space and for a yummy bakery/breakfast place to replace the "suspiciously underused" storefronts on the west side of Hyperion."

Mike - "Dean's chapter would be called, "A Thousand Shades of Taupe" and would be all about the two-year odyssey he went on to find the perfect color for our interior walls. 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Be Prepared Seismic Retrofitting

In addition to the creative neighbors profiled in this issue, many Franklin Hills residents also live and work at home. Catastrophic damage from an earthquake would affect not only our lives, but our livelihoods.

Seismic retrofitting is one proven way to reduce your risk of earthquake injury and damage, protect your economic investment, help minimize repairs and ensure you have a place to live. Retrofitting involves adjustments to make homes more resistant to earthquake activity, ground motion, or soil failure.

Many local homes are particularly vulnerable to earthquake damage because of hillside locations, having living space above a garage, and for being built before 2000, before current building codes were in place.

Large open space and wall openings on the lowest floor mean that there are fewer solid walls, and walls are structural elements that resist earthquake forces. The frames of older houses are often not bolted to their foundations, and cripple walls may lack bracing. Without adequate bolting and bracing, homes can slide or topple off their foundation during an earthquake.

Tell us a little about you as a creative couple.

Diana - "We met at a friend's party and talked till 5am about all the music we both loved, mostly Britpop bands like Pulp, Stone Roses, and Blur. Fast forward to today and we are trying to balance it all, like any parents are nowadays."

Talk to us about any rituals/habits/crutches that you rely on to help you define your day.

Diana - "As someone who has worked remotely for 12 years, the small rituals of one's day become really important. After I drop off my kids in the morning I return home and start my day with a breakfast that I prepare just for myself. It's not necessarily extravagant but it's my moment of tranquility."

Tell us a little about you as a creative couple.

Palmer - "We met at a party in New York and then eight years later we ran into each other again in LA (Austen: 'she didn't remember me'). Both Austen and I work from home and trade off responsibilities for the children. (Austen: 'She loved our two kids a lot quicker than she did me or LA'). Austen has a good eye and can tell me when something looks off in my painting (Austen: 'She has never once used one of my ideas')."

Talk to us about any rituals/habits/crutches that you rely on to help you define your day.

Austen - "I have a theory that the first thing I do on any given day will be the best thing I do all day. For my work, the earlier I get started, the better the work will be. Basically, I have to do everything in my power not to start with a Time Waster's Triathlon of Wordle, Spelling Bee, and Connections."

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For creatives trying to figure it all out, give them some advice.

Diana - "Find out about events, concerts, popups, etc. LA is so car-centric and we are so often driving from one bubble to the next, it's not as easy as other cities might be in terms of just happening upon different things to do."

Now, what about Franklin Hills?

Diana - "We moved to Franklin Hills from Silver Lake one month before the pandemic started and it was such a blessing. We have never felt more at home in LA than we do here – it really is the people that make our neighborhood so special. That said, every day that I drive or walk my kids to school, going through the hills and over the bridge, I honestly marvel at my surroundings."

Lastly: If you were to write the chapter in the book of your life that you are in right now, what would it be titled?

Diana - "\$6 tickets to the Hollywood Bowl on a Tuesday night are a ticket to freedom."

For creatives trying to figure it all out, give them some advice.

Austen - "Don't be so focused on the exact creative job you see for yourself, as sometimes other opportunities will give you the idea you were born to do. But first, throw your current smartphone in the Silverlake Reservoir."

Palmer - "We got a good deal on our house and feel so unbelievably fortunate to live in this incredible neighborhood. I especially love Baller Hardware and Baller Art Ware and buy all my supplies there."

Palmer - "I'll let the writer take this one." Austen - "Can we please talk about your idea tomorrow? I JUST fell asleep."




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The Magic of Lyrical Streets

Franklin Hills is not just a neighborhood; it is a community of talented musicians. Walking down the 2500 block of Lyric Avenue with a spring in your step, you might start whistling to the tunes you hear drifting out of the houses on the appropriately named street. These talented musicians often leave their windows and doors opened to share their music with the neighborhood audience. Songs fill the air as the notes float up, up and away.

Jay is a film and tv composer and pianist who performs every Sunday night at El Prado on Sunset in Echo Park.

Ramona, indie pop singer turned musicologist, is a music professor at Occidental College and a PhD musicologist candidate at UCLA.

Across the street Zara Vaughan, professional jazz singer, is often heard accompanied by her pianist.

A few doors down is Carole, who went back to playing classical piano music during the pandemic. She now studies with another Franklin Hills resident and college music professor, Joseph Klice.

Up the hill on St. George, Jenny is a Doctor of Music who teaches at Claremont College.

Back on Lyric, other keyboard composers work at home in their studios, and children like Walter study piano with retired LAUSD music teacher DeeAnn Bowater. DeeAnn gives back to her community by providing lessons on a variety of instruments to many local school kids for a nominal fee.

The magic continues and wafts up Myra, Holly Knoll and beyond. among the Franklin Hills. Our lyrical community helped us overcome fear and isolation during the quarantine by soothing souls, and we are extremely grateful for this community of creatives who continue to bring joy and happiness through music.

Lesley graciously agreed to be the honored guest at our book club earlier this year when we chose her excellent, nonfiction book: Everybody Behaves Badly: The True Story behind Hemingway's Masterpiece: The Sun Also Rises. Lesley brought her passions, sharp intelligence and wry humor to that discussion. The book is riveting and terrific as was hearing about her creative process.

Her subsequent book, Fallout: The Hiroshima Cover-up and the Reporter Who Revealed It to the World, was selected as one of the New York Times's top 100 books of 2020, and is currently in development as a series. 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A Snapshot of Photographer Peter Yang

Peter Yang is a contributor to GQ, Rolling Stone, Esquire, and The New York Times Magazine, and has shot campaigns for Coca-Cola, Comedy Central, and Bank of America. His work has been recognized by American Photography and Communication Arts, but he would never tell you; because he is too modest. Luckily for me, he is also my neighbor and friend.



I first met Peter Yang at a neighbor's dinner party. Peter's wife, Jenni, was pregnant, and because our son was very young our neighbor thought it would be great for us to meet. We all exchanged pleasantries over a delicious meal and talked about careers and kids. Peter mentioned that he was a photographer but didn't go into detail about his projects. After dinner we looked him up and discovered that he has shot some of the most famous names in entertainment and politics!

Over the years Peter and Jenni have become close friends, as have our children. I recently sat down with him to discuss Franklin Hills living, what inspires him, and how he became a photographer.

When did you move to Franklin Hills?

Peter – We purchased the house in 2016, but didn't move in until 2017. The home was designed by architect Dick Lowry as his private residence in the early 1970s. The house contains a studio which was actually built a number of years before the home. I originally used the studio as an office as I'm used to shooting in rental studios and shoots of bigger scale in spaces that are much larger. During the pandemic I started shooting in the home studio and I still use it for my personal projects.

Do you find inspiration for your work in the neighborhood?

I spend my days here and I find it very inspirational. From the views outside my window, to the vibe here, and the quietness. I find a lot of peace here.

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Do you primarily shoot portraits, and who are some of your favorite subjects?

Yes. I've photographed [President Barack] Obama a few times over the years, but that first time for Rolling Stone was very memorable. From a career standpoint it was a really big deal for me at the time. I'm a big fan of comedy, so Nick Kroll and Amy Poehler have been really good. I love the Rock, he's always very kind. I always connect to my subjects from a shooting standpoint, but during the pandemic I went to a few homes and set up some studios outside. I think that was the only time that most of us were experiencing the closest thing to a shared experience. I remember going to George Clooney's house and Dwayne Johnson's house and we'd just be chatting about "what's it been like for you?". There was definitely a level of human connection back in a time that we didn't connect with people at all.

How did you first get involved in photography?

I always liked to do art. I used to draw a lot as a child but I didn't even know that art was a career option. My idea of a job was a lawyer, doctor, engineer or maybe marketing. When I went to college I was a business major, and then somehow I stumbled upon the journalism department and photography. I didn't even own a real camera, but I went there and I tried it out. In some mix between my obsessive personality, a little bit of art, and the thought that this could really be something, I found it there.



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
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
